We send our deepest sympathy to the family of Fred Archer who died on January 19th 2018. The following tribute was written by his daughter Jenni Wood:-

Fred was born in 1925 and raised in Charsfield. He first attended Charsfield school and then Wickham Market school from the age of eleven to fourteen.

On leaving school he worked on a chicken farm at what is now known as Moultons in Clopton. When that was sold he went to work at F J Martin's farm in Shop Road, where he stayed for over twenty-five years. It was here that he met his wife Myrtle to whom he was very happily married for nearly sixty-seven years until her death in 2015. Their first home was a Nissan hut in Manor Road where two of their three children were born. Later they moved to a house in Rouse Hall Estate where their third child was born. This was their home for over fifty years until they moved to a bungalow just a few yards up the road.

Fred was a quiet man who enjoyed pottering about in his garden and whittling away in his shed making things, miniature wheelbarrows being his favourite. He was very proud of his children, grandchildren and great grandchildren being especially pleased to welcome his great grandson Taylor just after coming out of hospital in June after being seriously ill. The last six months were quite hard for Fred, but he managed to stay in his own home until the end, passing away in hospital shortly after being admitted on 18th January. He will be greatly missed by his family and friends. The funeral was held in Clopton Church on 26th February.

Some of you may have noticed the distinctive green Commonwealth War Grave sign on the church gate. Most people know about war cemeteries abroad but less widely known are the 300,000 war graves here at home, on 12,300 sites. So that people know about war graves in their neighbourhood the Commonwealth War Graves Commission has begun a project to erect signs indicating where the war graves are located. We have one such grave in St. Mary's churchyard, on the west boundary. It is the grave of Arthur Edward Garnham of the Suffolk Regiment. Arthur was born and baptised in Otley and his family home was in Gibraltar Rd. He died in the Military Hospital in Harwich in 1916 as a result of wounds sustained during the conflict. That is why he is buried in his home village and not abroad.

By the time you read this we will be very close to Easter. We have a special celebration in church on Easter Day April 1st. when the Bishop of Dunwich, Mike Harrison, will be leading a Family Communion at 11.00a.m. Everyone will be warmly welcomed, and we hope you will stay and chat with Bishop Mike over refreshments after the service.

Spring is definitely on the way; there are a pair of tawny owls calling, very loudly, to each other in the churchyard.

Defibrillator 'Live' in Otley - A defibrillator has been installed on the outside wall of Otley Village Hall. This purchase, from Community Heartbeat Trust, has been made by Otley Parish Council with the help of Councillor Robin Vickery's Locality Budget, which we are most grateful. The defibrillator is in a locked cabinet, requiring key pad code access. In the event of an emergency you should ring 999 and they will issue the code.

48 residents attended the awareness session that was provided by Community Heartbeat Trust. This was a successful evening demonstrating the use of defibrillators and explaining how the equipment works along with the benefits of saving precious minutes in the treatment of sudden cardiac arrest. The response to the evening was very positive and helped raise confidence. This was a very welcome purchase and a great asset to the village. It is hoped it is never needed but it reassuring to know the back-up is there.

The Parish Council intend to follow this up with further first aid training in the future. We are also hoping to get VETS –Village Emergency Telephone System up and running for those who may need support during an emergency, particularly those on their own, disabled or vulnerable. More information on this will follow in due course. **Dog Fouling** - Otley Parish Council would like to make a polite request to dog owners to please clean up after their dogs. This includes footpaths around the fields. It is an offence to leave dog mess and very unpleasant for other members of the public. There are several dog bins around the village which allows owners to 'bag it and bin it', however, it has been brought to the parish council's attention that some dog owners are bagging it then leaving it in hedges and ditches. This is not acceptable and dog owners should please take it home and dispose of appropriately.

<u>**Clothing Bank</u>** - The clothing bank based at the village hall car park is regularly used by kind donators of clothing. It is regularly collected and emptied of donations. On the occasion when residents find the clothing bank full please do not leave bags outside the bank. Members of the Community Council and Parish Council keep a check if the bank becomes full before it is due to be collected and emptied and contact the following number: 08000 902 321. Anybody is welcome to ring the number and help keep the village hall car park tidy and donations clean and dry. Thank you!</u>

RUSSELL LING REPORTS

In 2017 the rainfall was lower than normal, but I have always found in the past it usually equals itself out eventually. This year has started dull and damp with 2.45 inches for January but there is plenty of winter weather to come.


<u>Threshing continued</u>: Ten workers were required on the day of the thresh. Two men on the corn stack who pitched the sheaves onto the stage of the drum. A bin cutter who held a curved serrated knife in his hand, he would use this to lift up a sheaf and cut the string "the

bin" as it was called into the arms of the feeder. The feeders job was to allow the sheaf to roll off his arms in a continuous movement into the drum. The drum was about 18" in diameter and 2ft long, it had rasp bars fitted lengthwise and these would rub the sheaf against the concave. This separated the grain from the straw which would be bounced up and down by the straw walkers to complete the operation. The straw was carried up by the pitcher on to the straw stack to be stacked by two more men plus a third when it reached the roof line.

The grain and chaff would be separated by a fan which blew the chaff to where it was bagged off into large hessian bags. The chaff bagger had a very busy job when threshing wheat as it came off in large quantities and one bag had to be tied up while the other one was being filled. Another man carted the wheat chaff away on a tumbrel, carried it up a ladder to the stable loft where it was tipped out and used for horse feed.

The grain then went over two sieves which separated the small grain from the best which was sold. At the front of the drum, there were bagging off chutes. The grain was bagged off into comb sacks. The best grain would be weighed off on a weighing machine next to the drum. Two men were employed on this job and when six combs had been bagged off they were loaded onto a tumbrel. One of the men would take the load to the barn and then carry them off and stack them two high. The comb sacks capacity was 19 stone of beans,18 of wheat,16 of barley and 12 of oats. The engine driver's sole occupation was to keep the steam up, clear any blockages and repair any broken belts.

In the early part of the 20th century farmers had to borrow extra hands from their neighbours, these men were paid more money, so were willing to do the hard, dirty work. They started at 6.30 am to prepare for a 7am start. There would be a break at 10 am and the farmer would supply beer. Dinner was at 12 o clock, another break in the afternoon and then they would work until the corn stack was finished.



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

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
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
