Tribute to Albert Taylor-Balls

Hall farm was bought by Albert's father in 1959 and Albert worked for him until it was sold to Buchannan in 1966. The farmhouse was unfortunately burnt down in February 1962. In January 1966 a Lightning fighter plane from Wattisham airfield crash landed in a field next to the Helmingham road, Otley. Albert was ploughing in a field nearby and ran over to the site and spotted smoke coming out from the fuselage and when he looked inside saw a small flame burning from a pipe. There was fuel spilled around the plane, so he got a pail of water from the cottage opposite and put it out which may have prevented the plane catching fire.

Sadly, the pilot was killed when his ejector seat failed to go off when he was airborne due to a malfunction but operated when the wing hit an Oak tree. Later that year Albert married Dinah Stebbings and moved into Greenways on the Ipswich road.

Albert was often called upon to destroy wasp nests and he was also adept at killing moles, he would however be best remembered for his work in keeping the grass and hedges cut in Otley churchyard which he did for some twenty-five years. The churchyard always looked immaculate and his presence and help will be sorely missed.

"NO COOK PUD"

Sent in by Tess Papworth

This is a very simple, easy, no cook pudding. Delicious at any time of the year.

10 fluid ozs double cream

10 fluid ozs natural yoghurt

3 ozs mini marshmallows

8 ozs FROZEN raspberries

2 ozs demerara sugar

Method:

- 1) Lightly whip cream
- 2) Fold cream into yoghurt. Stir in marshmallows & raspberries still frozen. These will permeate the pudding as they melt.
- 3) Spread mixture into a shallow serving dish. Smooth top & sprinkle with demerara sugar.
- 4) Cover dish with cling film & put in fridge for 24 hrs or 48 if possible.
- 5) Just before serving sprinkle a little extra demerara sugar for added crunch if desired.

RUSSELL LING REPORTS

November continued to be relatively mild but mostly dull. The rainfall was still low for the time of year with only 1.30 inches which fell in small amounts at regular intervals during the month.

Last year's weather was unusual - the winter was mild we had storm Doris in February with winds of 70 mph, but we also had some mini heatwaves in May, June and July. The rainfall has been sporadic, but December made up for it giving us a yearly total of 21.25 inches.

In the days before combines were used for harvesting, farmers had their corn stacks threshed with a drum which in the early days was powered by a steam traction engine. These threshing tackles which were owned by contractors consisted of a steam engine, drum and pitcher and they were moved between farms to carry out this work. Apart from the driver there were two men who accompanied the tackle to position it and to make sure that the drum was level.

During the harvest corn stacks were built opposite each other beside a hard-stone road. The size of the stacks were ten yards by five yards with a sloping roof which was thatched after harvest to keep the rain out. The distance between the opposite stack was approximately five yards, the drum was positioned so that the drop boards each side could be raised to make a platform which would just touch each stack. The opposing stacks would be threshed separately, and one straw stack would be made from the two, the pitcher was an elevator with a trace which had overhanging tines so that the straw couldn't be blown off in a strong wind and was positioned at the rear of the drum behind the straw walkers. The steam engine was at the front of the threshing drum and powered it by means of an endless crossed belt from the large flywheel which was situated at its left-hand side. The reason that there were no joins in the belt was firstly it gave it more strength and secondly should the belt fasteners break it could cause severe injuries to the workers bagging off the grain. The drum shaft in turn had a pulley on the right-hand side of the drum and this with a series of flat belts and pulleys powered the remainder of the

machinery which consisted of sieves, elevators, straw walkers and the pitcher. *To be continued.....*

Debenham Group Practice

For the benefits of our patients and in partnership with Public Health, Suffolk County Council, we are looking to increase the usage of the blood pressure machine that is based in the reception area at Debenham.

We would specifically like to encourage any patients with hypertension who may not have had a recent reading to please come into the surgery at any time during normal opening hours and take your own reading on the machine in the waiting room. It only takes a couple of minutes and you can then give your printout results to the receptionist who can update your medical records.

However, the blood pressure machine is here for all our patients use and benefit, so even if you are just calling in to collect your medication or are attending the surgery for any other reason, we would still encourage as many of you as possible to take your own blood pressure – you don't need to print out your results or hand it to a reception for adding to your medical records. And you do not need an appointment.

For anyone who would like to find out more about the importance of knowing whether you have high blood pressure, the following link will provide you with some general useful information:

It was so cold last night, that I put anti-freeze in my hot water bottle.



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
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
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
