Weather July 2019

July began with a short heatwave but just as we thought that it was going to be another 2017 it all changed to being unsettled again. We Plough the Fields and Scatter

Harvest Festival used to be celebrated at the start of the Harvest season beginning in August and was called Lammas, meaning 'loaf Mass'. Farmers made loaves of bread from the new wheat crop and gave them to their local church. They were



then used as the Communion bread during a special mass thanking God for the harvest. The custom ended when Henry VIII broke away from the Catholic Church, and nowadays we have harvest festivals at the end of the season. At the start of the harvest, communities would appoint a strong and respected man of the village as their 'Lord of the Harvest'. He would be responsible for negotiating the harvest wages and organising the fieldworkers.

The end of the harvest was celebrated with a big meal called a Harvest Supper, eaten on Michaelmas Day. (The Feast of Michael and All Angels, which is celebrated on the <u>29th of September</u> every year. As it falls near the equinox, the day is associated with the beginning of autumn and the shortening of days; in England, it is one of the "quarter days".) The 'Lord of the Harvest' sat at the head of the table. A goose stuffed with apples was eaten along with a variety of vegetables. Goose Fairs were and are still held in English towns at this time of year.

The tradition of celebrating Harvest Festival in churches as we know it today began in 1843, when the Reverend Robert Hawker invited parishioners to a



n 1843, when the Reverend Robert Hawker invited parishioners to a special thanksgiving service for the harvest at his church at Morwenstow in Cornwall. Victorian hymns such as "We plough the fields and scatter", "Come ye thankful people, come" and "All things bright and beautiful" helped popularise his idea of harvest festival and spread the annual custom of decorating churches with home-grown

produce for the Harvest Festival service.

In Otley a memorial to the left of the organ celebrates the life of James Last who died in 1843 at the age of 64. The then Rector, Francis Storr, wrote a book about him entitled 'The Christian Farmer' of which some 7000 copies were sold. In nearly every line of the memorial some phrase from scripture is used – appropriate for one who was wholly committed to the Christian faith and life. In his time he must have been generally respected, in evidence of which his memorial was erected. The story is told that he would not start the harvest without the Rector being invited to cut the first swathe – how things have changed.

Harvest Festivals are held in each of our Churches and are advertised in the magazine. Do come and join us to celebrate this special time of year.

RUSSELL LING REPORTS

July was and still is the main month for haymaking, in the horse age it was a slow process and took up a considerable number of man hours particularly when the weather was unsettled. The grass was cut with a horse drawn mower called a grass clipper and was pulled by two horses guided with reins by a man sitting on an iron seat. A four foot cutter bar on the right hand side of the clipper with a reciprocating knife driven by the wheels of the clipper through a connecting rod cut the grass. It was essential that the finger points through which the knife went were sharp as tufts of grass could adhere to them and cause a blockage. The knife guides must also hold the knife down tight to the fingers otherwise a clean cut would not be possible. If a blockage did occur the drive to the knife had to be disconnected this was done by turning over with your toe a short knob low down beside the seat. As there was no reversing mechanism the driver had to get off and pull the machine back with the help of the horses and then clear the blockage. For transport the cutter bar could be raised and held in a vertical position. Horse drawn machines were made of solid iron parts and would last a



very long time as the mechanism would only be turning relatively slowly.



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
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
