Christmas Eve

How do you celebrate Christmas Eve? It has its own customs, the most popular of which is going to Midnight Mass, or the Christ-Mas. This is the only Mass of the year that is allowed to start after sunset. In Catholic countries such as Spain, Italy and Poland, Midnight Mass is in fact the most important church service of the entire Christmas season, and many people traditionally fast beforehand. In other countries, such as Belgium and Denmark, people dine during the evening, and then go on to the Midnight Service.

The British are behind some countries when it comes to exchanging presents: in Germany, Sweden and Portugal the custom is to exchange on Christmas Eve. But the British are ahead of Serbia and Slovakia,

where the Christmas tree is not even brought into the house and decorated until Christmas Eve.

Yule logs are not so popular since the decline of the fireplace, but traditionally it was lit on Christmas Eve from a bit of the previous year's log, and then would be burned non-stop until 12th Night (6th January). Tradition also decreed that any greenery such as holly, ivy or mistletoe must wait until Christmas Eve until being brought into the house.

OUR FASCINATING LANGUAGE

To **Rob Peter to Pay Paul**. This phrase means to take or borrow from one source to contribute to another. Unwittingly you often solve one problem but create another. Use of this expression can be traced back to December 17th. 1540 when

the church of St. Peter in Westminster became a cathedral. Its elevated status only lasted ten years when the diocese of Westminster was placed back under the authority of St. Paul's Cathedral. St. Peter's became just a church again. To add insult to injury, much of the land and property of St. Peter's was then sold off to help fund repairs to St. Paul's. There was, understandably, public outcry at the robbing of St. Peter's to prop up St. Paul's. As a consequence the expression became popularised & is still in general use today.



RUSSELL LING REPORTS

October was the month when the winter wheat and barley was drilled. Before the drill was invented in the middle of the 19th century the seed had to be sown by hand and then harrowed in. The invention of the drill was a huge improvement as not only did the seed coulters put the grain in at a depth which reduced the loss to birds but it meant that weeds could be hoed out between the rows with a horse hoe in the spring. The Smyth drill which was made in Peasenhall was the most popular one used. This drill had a box at the top for the seed with adjustable holes in the base, this allowed the contents to reach individual containers underneath. In order to regulate the correct seed rate to the coulters there was a seed barrel the width of the machine which had cups round the top edge of each

disc these lifted the seed from the container and dropped it down a tubular metal chute to the coulters. The Smyth drill had Suffolk coulters which made a furrow in the soil behind which the seed dropped. The coulters were on the end of a long arm which allowed them to move up or down according



to the level of the soil, they could also be moved laterally to change the width of the rows. The drill had a large wooden wheel each end which had a sprocket round the hub to drive the mechanism which could be lifted off by a lever at the end of the row to put it out of gear. In order to change the seed rate different size sprockets could be fitted between the drive wheel and the seed barrel. The seed barrel could also be changed to small or large cups depending on the size of the seed being sown. A frame in the front of the drill had two smaller wheels which pivoted at the centre allowed for turning at the end of the row. Two men were required to operate the drill one to control the horses and to steer the drill and the other to put the mechanism in and out of work and to check that there were no blocked coulters. Depending on the width of the drill it would require two or three horses to pull it.


